Writing a Narrative

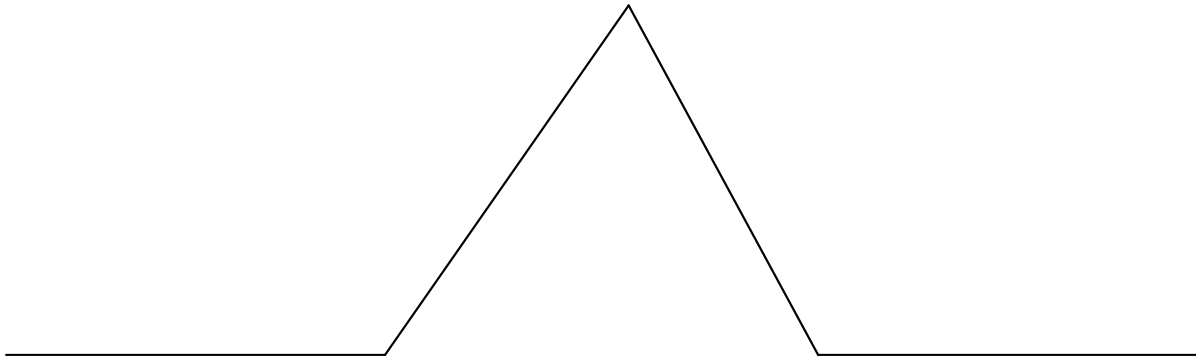
